And, holidays (Holy Days) determined people's daily calendars. Marriages united families; and, funerals were opportunities to say "goodbye" to departing members of the family and

community. The church played an essential role in village life.

Although our German ancestors observed many religious celebrations, Christmas and Easter were two important times of rejoicing and reflecting on the real meaning of life. To enhance these experiences, they devised special activities, such as Christkindlmarkts, Christmas caroling, Christmas trees, Advent calendars, and special Holiday treats.

My family and I have enjoyed visiting many Christkindlmarkts, including the very large one in

Nuremberg. Also, we have visited several smaller ones in small towns in Germany, as well as a few in America. You can count on great food and drink, hand-crafted items for sale, and the joy and fellowship of people celebrating the Christmas season. We purchased the small cookie. nativity

Mildred and John Harder have been collecting Nativity Sets (Creches) since 1970. On a trip to Germany in 1989, they visited the Goebel Factory in Roedenthal where they purchased the 17-piece Nativity Set shown in the photo. The figures are large; the top of the elephant stands 11" high. Interesting features of the set include the artist's use of three different modes of travel for the magi: traditional camel, Arabian steed, and Asian elephant, suggesting diverse areas from which the Magi traveled.





#### WHIPPED SHORTBREAD COOKIES

1 cup unsalted butter, at room temperature 1/2 cup powdered sugar 1 1/2 cups flour 1/4 cup cornstarch 1/4 t. salt Sprinkles

Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Line 2 cookie sheets with parchment paper.

In a large bowl of a stand mixer, beat softened butter with powdered sugar at least minutes, scraping bowl every two minutes. Add the flour, cornstarch and salt. Mix until combined. Using a spoon and a knife, drop cookie dough onto prepared cookie sheets, 12 to each sheet, for a total of 24 cookies. Form each cookie into balls, then slightly flatten them. Using a fork, press down on each cookie to make a pattern. Add the sprinkles to the top of the cookies. Bake for 10 - 15 minutes until the tops look set. Cool on cookie sheets for a few minutes, then place them on the kitchen counter to cool completely. Makes 24.

#### **NEW YORK CHAPTER NEWS**

#### **New York Chapter Fall 2023 Meeting:**

Despite heavy rain throughout, we had a great New York Chapter fall meeting while touring Fort Klock, Palatine Church, and Nellis Tavern in St. Johnsville, NY!

The great Les Stewart led us through Fort Klock, the heavily fortified 1750 homestead of Johannes Klock. The fort is located about 3/4 of a mile east of where the Battle of Klock's Field occurred on October 19, 1780. All the rain gave attendees a first-hand look at the small rivulet that was intentionally incorporated into the foundation of the fort.

Pastor Elisabeth Aurand of the Lutheran Churches in nearby Canajoharie and Stone Arabia gave us an excellent history of the Palatine Church in St. Johnsville. Built of limestone from a nearby creek in 1770, it was spared from destruction during the Revolutionary War.

For lunch, some attendees went to Parkside Diner and some went to Eisenadler Brauhaus, the first - and we dare say best - microbrewery in Montgomery County.

We then regrouped at Nellis Tavern, built in 1747 by Christian Nellis, Sr. The tour included a look at the exceptional stencil restoration, recently completed throughout most of the house. We also had a look at a section of a wattle and daub wall, and relatively rare split lath in one of the upstairs rooms.







#### **2024 NATIONAL CONFERENCE**

Distinguished historian Philip Otterness will be the keynote speaker at the 2024 Palatines to America National Conference. The conference will be held June 6th through 9th in Albany, NY. Dr. Otterness, known best for *Becoming German: The 1709 Palatine Migration to New York*, will be speaking on the New Bern, North Carolina Palatines, their interactions with local Tuscarora Indians, and a comparative study of that tribe's interactions with Palatines in New York's Mohawk Valley after they sought refuge there. He will also lecture about his adventures in various archives around the world in search of the Palatines' story. Conference attendees will also have an extended opportunity to ask Dr. Otterness any questions they may have regarding the Palatine migration.

The New York Chapter will finalize the roster of other lecturers at the conference over the next few weeks. On Thursday, June 6th, we will have a research day at the New York State Library, located just a few blocks from the site of the conference. The Henry Z Jones Jr. Palatine Research Center at the Germantown Library will be open on Sunday, June 9th for conference attendees who are able to spend all or part of the day in Germantown.

#### SILESIAN SPICE CRUMB COOKIES

#### Cookie Dough

- 1 ½ cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 4 large eggs
- 2 ¼ cups dark brown sugar
- 1 cup coarsely chopped toasted nuts (optional)

#### **Crumb Topping**

½ cup all-purpose flour

- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 2 ½ tablespoons butter, softened



#### Preheat oven to 350 F.

Grease or line cookie sheet with parchment.

Whisk together flour, baking powder, spices and salt. Beat eggs and brown sugar until thick; add flour mixture and nuts. Stir well to ensure all ingredients combined completely.

Make crumb topping by combining all ingredients. Use pastry blender or fingertips working in butter until mixture is crumbly.

Shape cookies using scoop or spoon to drop walnut sized mounds of dough onto cookie sheet several inches apart. Use bottom of glass to flatten to ¼ inch thickness. Generously top with crumb mixture.

Bake for 15 minutes until firm to touch. Yield: 40 cookies.

Remove to wire rack to cool. Keeps well for week or so in air-tight container.

#### Using DNA to Research Your German Heritage

Mary Eberle, JD, founded DNA Hunters in 2015 after careers as a biotech patent attorney and scientist. She is passionate about empowering people to harness DNA's power to solve family mysteries. Mary has used DNA to break through brick walls in her family tree. Her clients include adoptees and others with unknown parents or grandparents. DNAHunters.com

**Description:** This seminar offers useful information to both those just starting out with DNA testing to those who are experienced genetic genealogists—and everyone in between. With four talks, you're bound to learn several tips and tricks to using DNA evidence to advance your German ancestor research.

- 1. You've Got Your DNA Results—Now What? Learn the steps to analyze your DNA results. Steps include (1) having a family tree of your known ancestors and attaching your DNA to it, (2) identifying known DNA matches, (3) finding common DNA matches to your knowns, and (4) deciphering your unknown DNA matches—possibly some of whom might help break down a brick wall in your genealogy.
- 2. Understanding Ethnicity Estimates Learn what you can glean from your ethnicity estimates. We'll focus on Ancestry's ethnicity estimates. We'll also cover ethnicity estimates at FamilyTreeDNA, 23andMe, and MyHeritage. Learn why each company's results differ and why sibling results can differ. A better understanding of your ethnicity estimates might help with your German research.
- 3. Finding Relatives and Ancestors in Germany Learn how to find DNA matches currently living in Germany at each DNA testing company. Those German matches, matches sharing German ethnicities, and unknown matches with links to Germany can lead to unknown German ancestors.
- 4. **Case Study** This case study will cover how I found my unknown 2<sup>nd</sup> great grandfather, who was a German immigrant to Toronto. you'll learn the steps of combining DNA evidence with paper evidence that led to him. The most important steps were (1) target testing family members, (2) deciphering our common unknown DNA matches to find their common ancestor, (3) determining how we might fit into the unknown's family tree, and (4) finding clues about his German hometown in the paper evidence.

This seminar includes our annual Ohio Chapter PalAm business meeting. Recordings of these presentations will be available to all registrants for a two week period on the Ohio Chapter of Palatines to America private YouTube channel. This gives you the availability to watch again, or if you can't be with us on the 6th you can watch at your leisure. ## German Resources from the Western Pennsylvania Genealogical Society

The Western Pennsylvania Genealogical Society (WPGS) is an organization of amateur and professional family historians and genealogists dedicated to the study and preservation of family history, mainly in Western Pennsylvania. Since 1974 WPGS has aimed to provide members with genealogically related information, connections, and resources to enhance your family history and research. The Library is a non-circulating collection of materials, and includes standard reference volumes, indexes on immigration and emigration, military history and genealogy research. There are also several hundred volumes of published family histories, church and cemetery histories, and locality research. WPGS President, Pam Israel will give us an overview of their collections and how to access them.

Surrounded by genealogy from a young age, Pamela Israel has long appreciated the richness that learning about your heritage and ancestors can bring. She loves helping others do the same. Pamela teamed up with her brother, a Germanic linguist, to launch Unlock Your History where she focuses on people's family history and he translates old documents. Pamela is the current president of the Western Pennsylvania Genealogical Society. She is a ProGen alum and earned a genealogical certificate from Boston University.

### Mason Dixon Survey: Genealogical Implications of a Changing Boundary



Tuesday, February 20, 2024

Changes to administrative boundaries can have major implications on where genealogists look for records. The Mason-Dixon line, surveyed between 1763 and 1767 by Charles Mason and Jeremiah Dixon, marks part of the borders separating four states: Pennsylvania, Maryland, Delaware, and West Virginia. The survey resolved a border dispute that had its origins almost a century earlier in the somewhat confusing proprietary grants by King Charles I to Lord Baltimore (Maryland), and by his son King Charles II to William Penn (Pennsylvania and Delaware). Our presenter will provide an overview of those disputes, the survey process and intent, and what it means for genealogical research.

### 2024 FamilySearch Library Research Trip

The PalAm annual research trip to the FamilySearch Library in Salt Lake City will be held in from September 8 – 15, 2024. The registration fee provides 7 nights of accommodations at the Salt Lake Plaza Hotel which is only a two minute walk to the library. A block of rooms has been reserved and are available on a first-come, first served request. All travel and meal expenses are the responsibility of attendees. The hotel rate is provided at a significant discount based on regular room rates.

The library was closed for a significant period of time during the COVID pandemic and during that time made a number of upgrades to make the research experience more comfortable.

If you have never been to the FamilySearch Library, going with a group can be a beneficial experience. While it is true that a growing number of records are available online on the FamilySearch website and other genealogy websites, I truly believe that making a trip to the library can provide you with resources that are not available to you from home.

Unless you are a member of the LDS church many of the films for Germany are not viewable at home. Instead you must go to either a FamilySearch Center or Affiliate Library to view these films. Those films that have these restrictions are all viewable at the FamilySearch Library. Also, there are research experts in different specialties (including Germany) that can assist you with your research plan and also translate documents. Perhaps one of the overlooked benefits is the extensive collection of books, periodicals, and maps available. The section of books from Germany covers several hundred linear feet. Another benefit that library visitors can utilize is the ability to scan books. The library has at least three different types of book scanners. You can also convert many forms of analog format (photographs, CDs, VCR, cassette, 8 track and reel-to-reel tapes, etc.) to digital format at no cost.

Salt Lake City has an excellent public transportation system (TRAX) with a stop directly in front of the hotel. The major downtown area is a free zone within this system.

### PalAm Membership and Webmaster Apprenticeships

I intend to retire as Membership Registrar and Webmaster in July 2025. This sounds like a long time from now, but it gives us plenty of time to find replacement people for those positions. It is up to you, the members of Palatines to America, to help find these volunteers.

The Membership Registrar is vital for maintaining the member data including updated contact information, new member applications, and renewals for both national and the chapters. If you are a person who thrives on accuracy and are willing to learn how the database technology works, you can work with me as an apprentice and try it out.

The best candidates will already understand how databases function. This is more than Excel spreadsheets. If you have worked with library catalogs or other data management systems, you would be a good candidate. You will also need to learn PalAm policies and why the database includes particular data fields.

We can start with an introdutory Zoom session where I will show you some of the bits and pieces and you can decide if this is something you are interested in learning. You will have more than a membership year, including the Renewal Season, to become proficient and ready to take over in July 2025. There can be more than one apprentice, so if you are interested or know someone who might be interested, please contact me and we'll talk more about what this entails.

The Webmaster keeps the website updated, currently using the WildApricot system. WildApricot provides extensive "how to" documentation. Because it is a system developed with an internal membership module, it is convenient for us to use. It is possible that over time, PalAm would decide to find a different system that might fit our needs even better.

A webmaster apprentice could focus on only one of several modules. There could be one person as Events Manager, another for Store Manager, and one overall administrator. These are positions for those of you with a "techie" background. Have you maintained a web site? Have you edited web documents? Do you know HTML or other web-oriented codes? There are a multitude of possibilities for improving the website that can be explored.

Let me know if you have any interest in exploring the possibility of working on our website and I will set up a Zoom with you and give you more details.

Palatines to America is a volunteer-based organization, and I am grateful for volunteers who have already been helpful. Come July 2025, we don't want Membership or the Website to suddenly quit working.
